**CLERK’S REPORT:**

Hope our summer is as nice to us as our winter was. So far so good!

**Elections** are complete with Fred Blee and Tom Canfield remaining on the Village Board as our Trustees for another four years. Congratulations Fred and Tom.

**Village office update** – So far the office is running smoothly. Our desire is to not have to hire another person to assist with the duties of the office. It has been a challenge, but we are realizing that that is what we enjoy and do best. We are working as a team and working well together, and we are concentrating on prioritizing and going back to those things that can wait. We are looking at our software reports to find the best fit for the information we need, and contacting and seeking assistance from the software company if we are in need of additional or different information. They have been very helpful in directing us to the reports we need.

We are currently collecting Solid Waste, Water, and Taxes that went out on March 1<sup>st</sup>, working on the end of our fiscal year, and closing the books to provide the Annual Audit Report to NYS Comptroller’s office by April 30<sup>th</sup>. On occasion your office staff will volunteer their time, by staying after hours to get some things completed, or by taking work home with them.

With all that being said, we are finding that there is just not enough time to go above and beyond the already stringent, State and Federal, demanding deadlines and duties of a village office. We are in need of **volunteers** who are willing to assist with grants. The Village has the annual Music in the Parks grant, the

Director of the Summer Youth Recreation Program, with the assistance of the village office, has prepared a grant to continue to offer the swimming portion of the Summer Recreation Program. With the cuts to budgets and the economy as it is, our summer recreation program is a very important program to continue. The village office has also provided information for the parade that will be held during Newark Valley Days and the upcoming Farmer’s Market, and the NV Historical Society will be working on a Reserve America Grant of which the village will be the applicant. Each grant has an application process, overseeing the program as it takes place, and a final report to be prepared at the end of the program. **PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:**

The lack of winter was a nice change, and it allowed us to keep cleaning up after the September flood. The baseball fields are well on there way to being ready for the season, all fences are replaced and the fields have been rolled thanks to the town allowing us the use of there the roller. The mulch is being replaced this week and all the play toys are being checked over and will be inspected before spring. We are cleaning the trout ponds bathrooms and will be replacing any fixtures we need to and if the weather continues we will open them as soon as possible. The creek bank has been cleared and rolled and we hope to be able to place riprap along the area that eroded.

This winter we used sand with the salt to help save money, now we will be out sweeping the roads; we will start early April and be done as soon as we can. We will try to sweep when the roads have enough moisture to keep the dust down, and then we will start to clean out the catch basins.

The budget is doing well and it will as long as the recycling continues to be done properly. We have noticed yard

waste in the garbage and I have told the guys to start to leave it, as it does not belong in the garbage if you want it pick up, other then the appointed days; you will have to buy a tag to put on it. The yard waste schedule is as follows.

Leaves and small brush (no rocks and dirt) needs to be in paper bags or cans that can be dumped into a truck. Larger brush and limbs need to be no thicker then 6 inches and less then 4 feet long.

We will be out early mornings to listen to hydrants and later in the morning to listen to service valves to try to locate leaks in service lines. Later in June we will be flushing hydrants, so watch the village web site for the exact date and remember if the water appears cloudy you will want to run the water for a short time and it will clear up. At this time it looks like we will be able to finish the water project this year, while we were doing the replacements of the mains we found three more streets that have undersized pipes and it looks like we will be able to use the remaining grant funds to change them.

**CODE ENFORCEMENT:**

Warm weather arrived early, and we found ourselves outside taking care of old problems and starting new projects to enhance our properties' appearance and enjoyment. Remember that many projects require a building permit. Please call or e-mail if you have any questions about this.

Last year the hot topic was the sidewalks, and so it is that time again. Thank you to those who replaced their sidewalks last year, and here is hoping others will do the same this year. Reminder that Village Department of Public Works has sidewalk forms for use, free of charge for Village residents, on a first-come-first served basis. Contact DPW early on to be sure forms are available; also DPW will tear out old concrete if you call and make an appointment – reach DPW at 642-8700.

As flowers grow and trees leaf out there are many sidewalks with overgrowth that blocks either the sidewalk itself, or branches hang too low -- these safety hazards impact pedestrian traffic so keep growth cut back. Please!! be a responsible pet owner and clean up after your pet defecates on someone else's property, public sidewalks, or the Trout Ponds! Carrying a small plastic bag that covers your hand to pick up the waste is a simple solution! Code Enforcement will keep following up on complaints and fines can be levied per Village Code.

Lastly, vacant buildings in the upcoming months will have a large sign near the door. The sign will have a square, diagonal line, or an "X". This is a requirement of New York State Fire Code law that was enacted January

2011. Should the building catch fire, this will warn the responding fire company about the building's condition. Owners will be contacted regarding this matter, but if any questions now contact me.
