MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR:

Hello everyone,

We write this as Father's Day passes, the summer's first days approach and the school year is over for most. Congratulations' to those daughters and sons or grandchildren graduating; and turning the maturity corner to commence lives another year older and another year wiser. We guide future generations to prize fearlessness with a big heart and a strong mind.

The Press Sun Bulletin front page Monday, June 17th highlighted Natalie and Marty Matrazzo's company Farmhouse Malt as an excellent example of risk and success. Natalie and Marty could not malt in the Town of Berkshire and they chose our Village for their production facility. Our Village has many family owned services and businesses who contribute toil and payroll dollars to this community. The locally owned operations invest in their and our future. A portion of New York State Sales Tax collections from customers by our local businesses returns to our County and eventually to our Village and Town. I hope and trust we all shop locally when possible.

Your Village Government is seeking matching fund grants from New York State for exterior revitalization of the Park Street Municipal Building. Brick pointing, roofing, proper drainage from downspouts and eaves will lengthen the life of this wonderful former Newark Valley District

School now housing the: U.S. Post Office, Berkshire Emergency Ambulance Squad, Newark Valley Historical Society, Boy Scout Troop, Northern Tioga County Youth League, TOPS and your Village Offices. Many local not for profit agencies utilize the Rollie Noble Room for weekly or monthly meetings so we understand the economic impact of infrastructure improvement for this building. We will report the outcome as we know more. The environmentalists have completed their study of the privately owned Five Clinton Street (Ladder Factory) which you may view on

www.villageofnewarkvalley.com. The Village will contact the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) with the study results, await their comments and proceed. We will share outcomes as time progresses.

Village Trustee Fred Blee and his family moved out of the Village and resigned the board position. At the July Board Meeting I will recommend to our Trustees; the appointment of Brook Street resident Michael Reynolds to fill that unexpired term. We know the Reynolds family and believe Michael will be a fine board member. We will miss Fred Blee and his humor and his sound advice and counsel.

I was responding to questions from a life-long resident yesterday; explaining issues with the Ladder Factory and Municipal Building project. Her comment was: "Nothing Is Easy – Is It?" A good board faces situations requiring correction with

possible solutions. So I agree – nothing is easy.

The Trout Ponds Park is open – The Village Green with new floral and tree plantings and The Nick Wilson Skate Park is open - Friday nights at the Depot – Summer Reading at the Library – Sunday afternoon Farmers Market on the Village Green - Cruise In First Saturday night of each month at the Depot - Newark Valley Days second weekend in August. PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:

Summer is here and the DPW has begun this year's project of road repair on Bridge St and Rock St. We know that many more roads need to be redone now that the water project is complete but we have to take them in order of importance and need. Bridge

Street railroad tracks that have been the topic of meetings and conversation for so long have been repaired as far as the DPW can; the rest needs to be taken care of by the IDA and railroad company.

The Village had gone through an energy audit and they have pointed out many areas that we can potentially save money by changing some fixtures and bulbs, it did add up to a good sum of savings. The contact for the audit people that did the village is NYSEG/RG&E Energy Service Representative; the DPW has already started some of the changes.

The trout ponds park, and all Village buildings and properties have gone through our annual insurance inspection and have only minor repairs which have been taken care of, the bike and skate park is starting to show its age and is in need of minor repairs and it needs to be sealed again this year, the DPW will be starting that as soon as possible which may cause some bike park closing for a short time.

The water department has just had a Village wide leak test done and we have a small leak on an old part of the system and by the time you read this it will be repaired. The company has been here many times before and they were surprised on how far we have come; they have, in the past, found between 10 and 20 leaks per visit that we had to repair. The DPW will be trimming around the hydrants so if you place flowers around them please remember to plant only small flowers so we are not forced to cut them, we will be flushing hydrant in the next few weeks so if you see us doing that remember to flush your water if it becomes cloudy. It is necessary for us to flush hydrants to ensure that they are working properly and to remove any build up in the pipes.

Enjoy the summer and remember that it doesn't last long enough, and as usual you can contact the DPW at 642-8700 any time you have questions.

Leaves and small brush (no rocks and dirt) needs to be in paper bags or cans that can be dumped into a truck. Larger brush and limbs need to be no thicker than 6 inches and less than 4 feet long.

CODE ENFORCEMENT:

Q: Can I have an open fire in my backyard?

A: No. Section 71-2 of the Village Code, "no person shall build any bonfire or burn any papers, hay, straw, rubbish, shavings, packing, leaves or other waste or combustible material within the Village limits of the Village of Newark Valley."

NOTE: just because the STATE of NY lifts its "no-burn" ban, this does not affect the Village Code which prohibits burning.

Q: What about cooking outside?

A: Yes. "Small contained fires for the sole and express purpose of food preparation within a self-contained barbeque unit or pit, manufactured or built for the sole purpose of barbecuing food, are permitted, provided that such fires are either on private property or areas designated by the Village."

Any person violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall be guilty of a violation and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$250 for each offense or imprisonment for a period not exceeding 15 days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Q: What do I need to put a swimming pool on my property?

A: First of all you will need a permit. Speak with the Code Enforcement officer before doing so as there are several things you must know. Under the Uniform Code, a swimming pool is defined as any pool capable of containing more than 24 inches of water. Any pool HEIGHT less than 48” MUST have a FENCE around it. A pool ALARM is needed for ANY pool HEIGHT over 24”. An ELECTRICAL inspector must inspect the electrical hookup to the pool filter. A WADING pool is one in which the pool HEIGHT is UNDER 24”. It is suggested that any pool ladder be removed when pool is not in use, especially when no adult is home, or when house is empty due to vacation. As always, adult supervision is the best policy when any child is swimming.
