MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR:

Hi everyone,

Our Public Works guys; Bill, Scott and Steve completed water main repairs in all areas of the Village throughout the Spring. Last Winter's deep frost line along with continual shifting soil and rock caused six repair spots now fixed. Backhoe digging on the lower portion of Smullen Avenue located a bit of history. At three feet depth between Studio 38 and the ShurSave the guys excavated a large cement pad identified by Bridge Street resident Art Hillard as a dock for Cook Dairy. Very soon Public Works and local firefighters will begin verifying pressure for all hydrants and color coding each one based on Fire Code standards. Our hydrants installed during the water distribution project are in great shape but this coding will allow any firefighter from mutual aid agencies to know where to draw best for their tankers.

Your Village Mayor and Trustees wish to thank the Sidewalk Committee: Laurie Boldis, Sandy Carlin, Cindy Morse, Bob Stevens and Sharon Weed for their guidance and thoughts to date. On June 11th Rachel Jacobs, Deputy Village Clerk did submit and complete a NYS DOT Safe to Schools funding request for Whig Street. This two hundred sixty-five thousand (\$265000.) dollar project covers replacing damaged and/or new sidewalks

if necessary over the next five year period. As an overview; this DOT funding pays eighty (80.0%) percent of the cost while the Whig Street land owners receiving these upgrades see the remaining twenty (20.0%).

The funding announcements in October will determine if these requests are accepted. We will set meetings with Whig Street landowners if the grant is approved.

In July I will recommend revision to the sidewalk compliance codes with a five year extension to Summer 2019. Many residents did install new sidewalks and we compliment those initiatives. This work does enhance property value without assessment review. A bit of information now on existing Village walkways excluding Whig Street. The just less than one hundred responses to the Village sidewalk questionnaire varied from angry to proactive. Opinions differed from 'sidewalks not important' to 'sidewalks extremely important'. Examples: (*) Village is intrusive and has no business considering sidewalk codes; (*)Village has the sidewalk law (codes) and should enforce them; (*)if the Village Government wants sidewalks - they should pay for it;(*)we just installed new up to code walkway and we do not want to pay for our neighbors;(*)Main and Whig Street plus Lawrence Ave must have safe walkway because of student walkers;(*)Village should contract for

sidewalks and set up payment plan over multiple years for each landowner based on their exact cost;(*)The code has been on the books for years - why were they not enforced previously?(*) Pride in our community means home upkeep, including sidewalks(*)I just bought this home - why didn't the real estate agent tell us about this?(*) Forget the roads and place sidewalks at the Trout Ponds for those who exercise(*). Many different opinions from; do it, charge me and stop talking about it to; taxes are enough, already.

Residents are asking me why we chose Whig Street for grant aid instead of other roads. The answer: it is part of the 'safe route to school' NYS process; it is a major roadway with many sidewalks missing; children walking on a busy road. Others are asking; if DOT accepts our request - Whig Street areas getting new sidewalk will pay the cost at twenty percent and receive eighty percent funding. That is not fair to homes on other roads. About ten percent of our population responded to the questionnaire proving there are no quick ways of solving complicated questions but we will progress and report.

Architectural firm Crawford & Stearns will begin bid process this month for three hundred ninety thousand (\$390000.) dollar Municipal Building exterior brick and drainage renovation. Work will begin during autumn and we look for completion next summer. This work is made possible by a one hundred ninety-five thousand (\$195000.) Park & Recreation/Historic Preservation grant awarded to the Village of Newark Valley.

Soon an environmental firm will remove asbestos tile from the Rollie Noble Room made possible in part due to a five thousand (\$5000.) dollar grant from the Mildred Truman Faulkner Foundation awarded early this year. When removal is complete; a vendor will lay plastic covering base; then carpeting.

In late May we met with our NYS Assemblyman Chris Friend to describe the Five Clinton Street (Ladder Factory) distress. The structure owned by LeRoy Eiklor is quickly deteriorating due in part to partial roof cave in and there remains a pending court case. We will report as we progress.

Your Village works closely and shares public works services currently with the Town(s) of Berkshire, Newark Valley and Richford along with Candor Village. I am reaching out to others so all services we now provide will continue at the least possible cost to us and to those we work with.

CLERK'S REPORT:

The annual audit report has been submitted to the State Comptroller's Office, and as per requirement by USDA, our CPA firm has been in to do their annual audit for the Village of

Newark Valley. This audit takes anywhere from 3 days to a week or so to complete.

We are getting ready to begin our next \$390,000 project (\$195,000 grant funds) on the exterior of the Municipal Building. We hope to get that started very soon. We have also applied for a grant for the noble room floor, along with a grant for sidewalks on Whig Street. Now we wait until October when they announce the successful applicants. These grants keep Rachel very busy, but well worth it when we can save taxpayer dollars while maintaining what we have. Thank you, Rachel!

Village taxes will be collected in this office until October 31st, at which time they are turned over to the County. Any unpaid village tax will be assessed to your town tax bill. Please call ahead to get the correct amount due as we can only accept, by law, the correct amounts.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:

Summer is here and with summer comes lawn and garden work. At the village dump we have a large pile of compost for gardens and lawn. It is free for villagers to use as needed, but please take the old pile. It is easy to spot next to the road. If you are clearing your lawn from clippings then you can take it to the dump and add it to the grass pile. The DPW has its regularly scheduled pick up for grass and brush. The schedule is on the village web site. The brush can only be less than 6 inches thick and less than 4 feet long and stacked parallel to the

road, leaves are to be in cans we can dump or paper bags.

Solid waste is going good but to all new residents on a basic service you are allowed 2cans 32 gallons each per/week NOT to exceed 60 lbs. each. We still notice on occasion that recycles are making it into the cans and we try to take them out and or leave the can, so we all need to improve on that.

The DPW has repaired all the known water leaks in the village system and the well pump time has been cut in half. We will be going around to flush and test the hydrants to assist the fire department so they know how much water can be pumped from each hydrant for their safety and the safety of the water system. The DPW will also be testing the water system for any leaks that may occur.

We will be flushing hydrant in the next few weeks so if you see us doing that remember to flush your water if it becomes cloudy. It is necessary for us to flush hydrants to ensure that they are working properly and to remove any build up in the pipes.

The Trout Pond Park will have some construction if all the permits and FEMA agree on what can be done. At this time it looks like a 75' foot area will have Rip-Rap added to it next to the water crossing. The DPW will also be repaving Elm Street from Spring Street to Franklin Ave, this will be late June or early July. We will also be replacing the top of Smullen Ave and Cook Street with stone and oil, the reason we use stone and oil on that area is for traction in the winter.

Brush and leaf pick schedule for 2014

<u>Brush</u>	<u>Leaves</u>

Leaves and small brush (no rocks and dirt) needs to be in paper bags or cans that can be dumped into a truck. Larger brush and limbs need to be no thicker than 6 inches and less than 4 feet long.

CODE ENFORCEMENT:

As we head into summer please keep a couple of things in mind:
Open burning. It is against the law for you to open burn within the Village limits. However there is nothing wrong with a **“small” recreational fire**, of which must be contained in some sort of fire ring or pit and should not exceed three (3) feet in diameter. Do not put the pit or ring near a house, car, tree, or any other combustible object. You shall not burn any objects with any paint, heavy amounts of brush, leaves, grass, or any kind of toxic materials. Please make note that if you have a fire and it should get out of hand, that the fire department will be called and the fire will be put out. Tickets may need to be issued. So please do not take advantage of being allowed to have a small recreational camp fire.

If you have not already put up a new swimming pool this year and are intending on doing so please come into the Village of Newark Valleys office to get a permit. There are local and state regulations that have to be followed when installing a swimming pool to avoid any accidents or misinterpretations of the local and state laws and codes, please take the time to seek out the information and to get the permit. Above ground pool permits are \$20.00 and in ground pool permits are \$35.00.

Lawn and Landscape Maintenance is key to keep a community clean and presentable. Please keep in mind that the Village has codes in place that regulate how tall your grass can be, and that your landscape, trees, and shrubbery need to be maintained and trimmed. For the good of this small community and neighbors please take it to heart and keep your lawn and landscape maintained to the best of your ability.

It has come to my attention that there has been people entering the 5 Clinton Street Property, also known as the Ladder Factory. To anyone out there please keep out of this property, not only is it trespassing but it is dangerous. If anyone sees anyone entering this building please contact the Tioga County Sheriff’s Department immediately; and as well as the Village of Newark Valley during normal business hours.
