Hello Everybody,

At our July Village work session residents, landlords, contractors, Trustees and Mayor viewed the recently created Housing Study available to read www.villageofnewarkvalley.com. We listened to many ideas and concerns. An overriding issue from the public was a need for more strident Code Enforcement and possible State and/or Federal incentives home/business financial for renovation. Next week your Village will be mailing letters to owners of underutilized properties that may be vacant or blight. Those letters will detail the NYS **Building** current or compliances. Hopefully, the owners with thought and action in the near term will not require enforcement of codes by your Village. We believe this is sustainability for our community.

The Municipal Building window renovation process is moving along. Architectural firm Crawford & Stearns is readying the bid process with variations that may include external storm windows. We will report as time goes by.

Vegetable harvesting of the Village of Newark Valley, School District FFA and Owego Rotary sponsored Community Garden has begun. This Garden is supplying produce to the local Food Pantry at the Methodist Church for distribution in our Community. Our gratitude to School District and Rotary for working with your Village to make this happen.

Trustee John Tomazin suggested our Village Team upgrade the County IDA owned dirt path entering the Depot from Maple Street. With existing 'grinds' our Village and Town DPW staff laid a base, rolled and made more secure this walkway/driveway used by those enjoying the Depot. The County IDA approved this improvement and our thanks go to John, Village and Town DPW staffs.

A few days before Summerfest; vandalism abound. No point in details; other than repairs and replacements are underway. Most is complete as you read this; however, cost of replacement is never easy along with the sad reminder that some 'just do not care'.

Summer Youth Coordinator Heidi Cardone will soon supply the annual report for activities and numbers in this years' program. We do know participation is increasing and that is a sound rationale for this program that continues for so many years.

Usually these quarterly updates explain our current projects and thought process for your Village future. Before you go on to other matters in this letter: I wish to thank our readers for allowing me to work with Staff and Trustees for many years past and many years to come. I truly enjoy working with your voter choices for Trustees. Deputy Mayor Cliff Alexander with Trustees Scott Parmelee, Mike Reynolds and John Tomazin guide us to a shared

vision for our Village. Pam Benthin, Clerk/Treasurer, Bill Foster, Working DPW Supervisor, along with Jessica Moore, Peggie Nickels, Scot Coombs and Steve Pado get the job done. I enjoy their company and hopefully; they enjoy! That is the best that may be said about all of us; so, thanks to those we work with.

# **CLERK'S REPORT:**

The summer season is finally here and we hope that everyone is enjoying it to the fullest!

We would like to take this opportunity to welcome the newest member to the Board of Trustees, **John Tomazin**. John was nominated and sworn in at the regular monthly board meeting on May 14<sup>th.</sup> Welcome John! We look forward to a fresh viewpoint and new ideas.

The Village is always attempting to make village life as convenient as possible, whether through automatic payments, electronic notices, use of social media to keep you informed, etc. Well we're attempting to make your visit to the **Memorial Bike Park** a bit more convenient and enjoyable as well. On your next visit to watch your kids enjoy some summer fun you will see the addition of a porta-potty! We hope that this feature will make visiting the park as a family a more enjoyable one.

We would like to ask all Village residents to make it a point to be as aware of your surroundings and observant as possible when out and about in the Village, day and night. In mid-June there was a string of crimes of opportunity regarding unlocked cars and garages, now in July we had two acts of vandalism reported. First, the 'Welcome to the Village' sign at the northern end of the Village was stolen and has yet been found or returned. Then just days before NV Summerfest some of the open lawn areas at the **Trout** Ponds Park were driven through and intentionally damaged. Whether you're enjoying a stroll down the village streets or spending time at the Trout Ponds, the bike park or the Village green, if you see something that seems out of the ordinary or just not right please call the local authorities and report it. If anyone has any information regarding either of these instances of vandalism please report it to either the Sheriff's Department or the Village Office.

**Insero & Co. CPAs, LLP** completed this year's audit of the Village of Newark Valley Water Fund. We are happy to report that they had no significant findings.

Water meters will be read on August 15<sup>th</sup> for the next water/solid waste billing. The next billing will go out on September 1<sup>st</sup>, to be paid by Monday September 30<sup>th</sup> without a penalty. After September 30<sup>th</sup> penalties will be assessed. Don't forget that you can sign up for your payments to be withdrawn automatically from your checking/savings account, free of charge to you. Call the office 642-8686 for details.

September 1 is just around the corner, which means hunting season is soon upon us. Don't forget that you can avoid the lines of the big box stores and purchase your 2019-2020 **Hunting licenses** and tags right here at the Village Office.

I hope everyone gets to get out and enjoy these last few weeks of summer before the hustle and bustle of back to school and the holidays are upon us. Enjoy!

## **PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:**

DPW has had a busy spring/summer with the repair of the Trout Ponds Park lawn due to the water issues from last fall and early spring. We installed drainage to help redirect the water and reseeded the top soil all the way around the new playground area. New electric service was installed along with the new outlets and wiring of Pavilion #1.

We assisted the community gardens project with the placement of wood chips donated by the Town of Newark Valley Highway Department. Ground cover cloth was placed and topped with the wood chips to make a border around and in between the raised beds of the flourishing garden. We also worked with the Town Highway Department to improve the walking path between Maple Ave and Depot Street. You will also notice as you drive down Main Street through the Village we have gotten the new business banners hung.

The sanitation department has had an increase of items that need to be tagged in ordered to be picked up. Residents need to purchase tags at the Village office for items such as rugs, chairs, tables, couches, anything oversized that will not fit in the standard can. Also, we are getting a lot of heavy cans because of kitty litter, if you have a cat please put the kitty litter in a separate container. New trash cans are showing up along our route and some are too large. The Village code states maximum can size is 35 gallons.

#### **CODE ENFORCEMENT:**

Let's chat for a moment about people parking RVs and campers to reside in within the Village of Newark Valley. Our code does not allow for this type of living arrangement, this is considered unlawful ILLEGAL OCCUPANCY.

Chapter 101 of the Village code states:

§ 101-8 - A. Prohibition of mobile homes.(2.f) No travel trailer, boat, motor home or any other type of recreational vehicle is allowed to be placed upon any property within the Village of Newark Valley to be utilized, either permanently or temporarily, for residential or business purposes.

We are also having more inquiries about building in flood plain areas. Building within a floodplain area has more requirements than a typical build and a separate permit application beyond our normal building/remodel/repair permit application. There are building

elevation certifications, and a licensed engineer's report is required, along with full drawings. If you are considering building/remodeling/repairing in a floodplain zone please contact the office so that we may set up a time to discuss your plans and go over the requirements.

As we move into this final month of summer and all those last family reunions, BBQs and bon voyage off to college parties I'd like to remind everyone about outdoor fires. Open burning is prohibited within the Village limits. Chapter 71 of the Village code states:

§ 71-2 Restrictions.

A. No person shall build any bonfire or burn any paper, hay, straw, lumber, rubbish, shavings, packing, leaves or other waste or combustible material within the Village limits of the Village of Newark Valley.

B. Small, contained fires for the sole and express purpose of food preparation within a self-contained barbecue unit or pit, manufactured or built for the sole purpose of barbecuing food, are permitted, provided that such fires are either on private property or in areas designated by the Village. Every fire kindled as herein permitted shall be continuously under the care and supervision of a competent person from the time such fire is kindled until it is extinguished.

As CEO for the Village I have also been progressing on Fire Safety Inspections beginning with areas of assembly and will start on apartment housing in the near future. I will be in contact with owners to start scheduling inspections. Please remember that these inspection protect you the owner and your tenants.

# TAPPAN SPAULDING MEMORIAL LIBRARY:





The Chamber's website has had a facelift! Our home page and supporting pages have a new design and some new features which we hope will provide the communities with additional benefits.



# **New York State DEC:**

The Department of Environmental Conservation announced from Aug 2, 2019 through September 2, 2019 there will be free fishing permitted on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. 'New York residents and visitors (are being given) an opportunity to cast a line this summer in some of the best fishing spots in the state - Lake Ontario (including the Lower Niagara River) and the St. Lawrence River - even if they don't have a fishing license. Through September 2, 2019, all anglers are able to fish the New York waters of Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River without needing to purchase a state fishing license.

Lake Ontario is known as a haven for trophy trout and salmon fishing. In its 2019 rankings, and for the first time ever, *Bassmaster Magazine* named the St. Lawrence River the top bass fishing destination in the nation. While lake levels are expected to remain above average, recent history has proven that fishing in these waters will remain first-rate. There is great fishing to be had by anglers of all skill levels from shore or by boat.'

During this time, all applicable <u>state and federal</u> <u>laws and regulations</u> regarding seasons, catch rates, and size limits still apply.

# **Village of NV:**



D. A. Millen was the Village Clerk from 1904 – 1946.

At the January 4, 1904 Village Board meeting the Water works system was proposed to the Board for \$27,000 (bonds to be sold) "to supply said village and its inhabitants with pure and wholesome water" President G. E. Purple presiding — contracted to Fritz & Partridge.

At the June 11, 1907 Village Board meeting a Village Ordinance was proposed — No person shall ride any motor vehicle or motor cycle upon any of the sidewalks of the Village of Newark Valley. A person violating any of the provisions of this article shall be liable to a penalty of not more than \$5 for each offence.
