Hello Everyone,

This morning I attended our County Team Tioga; Economic Development and Planning (ED&P), Industrial Development Agency (IDA), Local Development Corporation (LDC) with Mission "Strengthen our Tioga County of Economy". This group represents "wins" for our local economic way of life nurturing new manufacturing and housing in our region. A group partnering with this agency is Rural Economic Area Partnership (REAP) who financed our Village Housing Study. This summer; I will update our community with hopeful funding resources through Tioga Opportunities, Inc. and if possible the new creation Tioga County Land Bank.

We previously reported your Village exploring funding strategy for flood mitigation on Cook Hill and Slosson Creek/Brook Street. We expected FEMA answer in January 2020; however, the agency informed us award announcements will be in January 2021. Those with the money control the situation. We will continue to monitor and report to you.

We await the NYS Historic Preservation/Parks & Recreation contract for your Municipal Building

Window rehabilitation. Once we receive; we will let the Request For Proposals (RFP) or bid process. Reminder; our two awards for this project are one hundred fifty thousand (\$150000) dollars. It appears project will begin summer or autumn of this year.

Water meter upgrades by rehabilitation or replacement are on the Agenda over the next few months. Calibration reliance and electronic upgrades are part of our review process. It is winter season so that is the time for Water Main breaks. Smullen Ave has suffered two Water Main breaks in the last three years. The first was just before Cook Street intersection and now half way up the hill. Smullen Ave piping was not included in the distribution project from eleven years ago.

Others have much to report so we will keep your Mayors report brief.

We wish you Safety through our Winter Months.

CLERK'S REPORT:

Hello all!

I hope everyone is enjoying our ever-changing weather this season. Spring is just around the corner ©

Our Village election will take place <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>March 18th</u>, in the Noble Room located in the Municipal Building, 9 Park Street in the Village of Newark Valley. Polls will be open from Noon until 9:00 PM for the purpose of electing two Trustees; each for a Four year term. The last day to register with the county board of elections is March 6, 2020. You must be registered and a Village resident to vote.

<u>2020-2021 Budget</u> has been completed and adopted with a tax rate of \$1.16057, this is a 1.529% increase. Tax bills will go out on or before March 1st. Tax collection will begin March 2nd, 2020 and due by March 31st with no penalty. Tax payments will continue to be accepted at the Village office until October 31st with penalties assessed.

Any <u>unpaid village water and solid waste bills</u> must be paid by the close of business Friday, February 14th. Any bills remaining unpaid will be sent to the County and assessed on the Village tax bills. Please call the office if you are unsure of your current amount due.

Our next Water meter reading will be February 14th for the March 1st water/solid waste billing. The billing will go out March 1st and due by March 31st without penalty. After March 31st penalties will be assessed. Remember you can have your Tax, Water and/or Solid Waste bills deducted directly from your checking or savings account every quarter free of charge. One less bill for you to remember to pay. If you are interested please come in or contact the office at 642-8686. Forms website also available on our www.villagenv.com

Since we are heading into the spring season we'd like to remind residents that we do have 3yrd dumpsters available for rent at the flat rate cost of \$100.00. So, if you find yourself in a large spring cleaning project and need a dumpster, stop by the office or give us a call and well get you scheduled.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:

The Village DPW has been busy this winter with snow and ice! Our equipment has been running good with only minor mechanical problems.

The bed chain broke on sander #1 along with the drive chain on sander #2, the Kubota had an axel problem but all were able to be repaired by the DPW staff.



You may have noticed that the Christmas decorations on the light poles were not lit this season, the problem is with the electric supply to the decorations, and the Village board is looking into it.



The sanitation department has noticed more recyclables in the garbage and we are leaving the whole can to be sorted by the resident, at this time our recycling is being picked up on Fridays by the county (it is part of your county

taxes) so the more recyclables that get sorted out of our garbage keeps the tipping fee down in turn helping keep your cost down.

The water department is looking into new software options for conducting readings of the water meters. The current software will be out dated and no longer supported as of June 2020. Should this update require any modifications to your current meters we will let you know in advance and schedule accordingly.

We have had quite a few leaks in service lines that have been repaired and most recently one main line leak on Smullen Ave. that we repaired on Tuesday January 21st, the water lost was estimated to be about 750,000 gallons.



As a final note from the DPW we have a crew member retirement coming up in June of this year and will be interviewing candidates for a possible replacement.

CODE ENFORCEMENT:

Your Village Code Officer has been busy conducting Fire Safety Inspections along with building permit inspections and approvals.

I am happy to say that the sidewalk owners on the west side of the Village have removed all the low hanging branches that were in violation last fall. The village code does state:



154-5 Height requirements:

It shall be unlawful for any person to suffer or permit the limbs or foliage of any tree or shrub on his property to extend over any sidewalk of the Village at a height less than 10 feet from the ground or over the street or alley at a height less than 15 feet.

Once spring arrives we will start assessing the sidewalks on the west side of the Village to insure that our residents have clear and safe walkways heading into the nice weather season.



If you are using wood, coal or pellet stoves to heat your residence, the stove must have been inspected by the Code Officer after it was installed. If you are not sure of the stoves inspection status please

contact the Code Office to check. If there is no record of inspection on file we can make an appointment to inspect as it's for your safety and to insure that you have no issues with you homeowners' insurance coverage. Also any new furnace i.e.: propane, fuel oil etc. needs to be inspected as well after installation.

The Northern Tioga Chamber meets the 2nd Thursday of each month. We invite you to attend our meetings, and welcome your participation and input.



My name is Paul Kunik and I am the newly hired Northern Tioga Outreach Worker for the Tioga County Rural Ministry (TCRM). It was late October and the weather was too cold to go without heat in the house. It was very gratifying to know that TCRM was using me to help this family as well as others in the underserved population in Northern Tioga County. With TCRM's mission of service to the sick, poor, and elderly in Tioga County, I was hired specifically to help families in emergency financial need for Northern Tioga (Richford, Berkshire and Newark Valley). This part time position complements my other part time position as Pastor of the 1st Congregational Church of Berkshire. I have a heart for Christian Service and for those in need. Having lived in N. Tioga for close to 50 years I have come to know many of the residents and the ins and outs of our part of the county. Knowing that by working for TCRM I can be even more involved in the community and be a part of helping those facing financial hardship is a blessing to me as I through TCRM could bless others. Village of NV:



April 22, 1912 – Proposal to establish an electric light plant and system to supply the village with electric light, heat and power. Proposal defeated 87/83.

December 15, 1913 - Proposal for municipal electric light system for Village presented again. Special election to be held December 23, 1913. This time the vote was in favor of the electric light system 107/63. Cost was not to exceed \$13,000.

First National Bank won the bid for all 26 bonds of \$500 issued to raise the \$13,000.

January 1, 1918 - Motion made and carried that the street lights be shut off at 9:00pm on moonlit nights.
