Recycling

At this writing Tioga County Legislature is considering local law update to revise curb side recycle mandates. Heretofore; Tioga County has contracted



Private Trash Haulers (Taylor Garbage, bid winner) to weekly curb side pickup and delivery to a transfer station. This current County contract will cease in late December of 2020. The new Local law in consideration transfers recycling responsibility to individuals or trash haulers. In all likely hood at January 2021 your trash hauler will be

responsible for recycling to a transfer station. Currently, those transfer stations are in Town of Barton and Glenmary Drive in Town of Owego. I am not describing why this is occurring; as the costs have more than doubled; a real consideration of tax cap issue for our County.

Your Village is working with Taylor Garbage and Tioga County to determine proper operating costs, tonnage totals and other matters so we may determine the most efficient way to take on this duty. This is too premature in the process to supply much data to our community at this time. We have less three months to consider and than decide. Village charge to public will be a line on our current quarterly Water, Solid Waste invoices. More information to follow.

Rate Review

On Monday evening September 28th the established Village



subcommittee listened to certain Village taxpayers concerning our Water Department charges. The current rates were determined during and after the Reservoir and Distribution System installation. Information to follow at an appropriate time.

Municipal Building Window Restoration

NYS has signed the contract for the restoration process to proceed; it is now a work in progress.

Nine Brook Street Demolition

Numerous Slosson Creek flooding of this home-initiated funding by FEMA. The funding agent deemed demolition as the least expensive solution. It is unknown when exactly this will happen; due to property purchase, bids and some actions beyond our control. We will keep you in the loop.

Other Information

Your Village Trustees authorized purchase of new Truck replacing our 2008 Chevy. We look toward October month end for truck delivery.

Village property taxes are due in the office by Monday,

November 2nd^t. Any unpaid taxes will be sent to the County in November and assessed to your Town taxes in January. Please remember no partial payments are allowed on taxes.

Our Village election was held September 15th.

This was the election that was originally scheduled for March but was



postponed due to the COVID shutdown. Please join me in congratulating Cliff Alexander and John Tomazin. Both were reelected as Village Trustees each for a four-year term. Congratulations gentlemen!

We received our Fiscal Stress score for the year 2019 provided by the State Comptroller Office. This score is to identify municipalities who are under fiscal stress. Scores are as followed: Significant - point range is 65-100, Moderate – 55-64.9, Susceptible – 45-54.9,

and No designation -0-44.9. We scored a **1.7** with No designation for the third year in a row. This is the best possible designation.

As the Mayor has mentioned, this Village office is currently working on and administrating several projects, 9 Brook St. – acquisition and demolition; potential changes to recycling, Municipal Building window restoration, water system rate review along with beginning of budget season very soon. PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:

As of the 14th of October, the bathrooms at the Trout Ponds Park have been closed for the season, please plan accordingly for your next visit. General grounds maintenance and beautification of the park continues with repair to the gazebo roof, removal of down trees and branches, as well as regular mowing

while the nice weather lasts. You will notice on your next visit that the fence at the entrance of the park has been renewed with all the damaged boards having been replaced and a fresh coat of paint applied. The Boy Scout Eagle Project at the Trout Ponds is nearing completion, hopefully residents will be able to enjoy the fitness trail before winter sets in. I want to thank local business, <u>Scott's Lawn Care</u> for the tree he purchased and planted at the park to provide future shade for visitors.

The DPW and Water Department's new employee Matt Seamans, has been continuing with on the jobtraining as well as working towards getting his water operator license and CDL license. Matt is being trained and working towards obtaining all the necessary certifications/licenses so that he can take over as the DPW Supervisor when I retire, but don't fret, I'm not leaving right away as the necessary water operator license can take up to two years to obtain.

The water department has been busy with gathering samples for multiple required water tests and have received the results, all of which are well below Department of Health & DEC standards. We are still working on the electric issues at the well house located on Whig Street, NYSE&G has had issues supplying good constant regulated power to this site. In effort to prevent damage to the well pump

and components and to keep the wells operating 'business as usual' we have been running this well via generator while NYSE&G works to correct the problem.



The sanitation department is in an unknown currently with the news of recycling being discontinued by the county. We are

looking into ways for the Village to take over and continue this service to our residents and what the costs will be. At this time, I have no more information but hope to find out more soon and will keep residents up to date.



TILLERS & TOILERS GARDEN CLUB:

NEWARK VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY:

The NV Historical Society received a grant last fall from the *Floyd* "Vic" Hooker Youth Fund through the Community Foundation for the Twin Tiers to improve the driving lanes both for the Farmstead and the soccer fields. This was a joint effort for both of our organizations. On the south entrance we dug down about 4", laid down



road fabric and applied stone right up to the highway. On the north entrance we just did stone. For the driving lane that runs parallel to Route 38, we took off the sod, laid fabric, and dropped gravel for about 100 yards. We also put in a gravel pad for the dumpster.

Soccer club workers laid stone in a triangular pattern coming off the normal entry across from the Farmstead. Two soccer club members donated about \$300 worth of road fabric. We got a good price break from Lopke Contracting and were able to acquire 480 tons of gravel. Fred Kiechle, Jr., helped out for a day, and Bob Danneker helped for three days. Skip Williams and his tractor helped both the Society and the soccer club. Kurt Brennan loaned us his dump truck which was very helpful. Next year we will have less mud on our boots and less concern for school buses getting stuck when children arrive for school tours.


The Newark Valley Historical Society recently completed a grant funded through the generosity of the Mildred Faulkner Truman Foundation. A covered shed attached to our Loom Barn was in need of reconstruction. At the suggestion of our fiber arts guild, Shuttles and Spindles, about half of the area has been enclosed. This will allow more space for and display school tours to and

demonstrate various aspects of the fiber arts: processing natural material, spinning, weaving and dyeing. Next to the herb garden the guild created a small area for plants that are used for dyeing.



Members of the Shuttles & Spindles Guild started meeting again, outdoors, in July. They held a business meeting, with social distancing. August's meeting was a presentation on silk, and September's workshop was on Japanese Indiao dyeing. They are thrilled with the Loom Barn's addition that Seth Tarbox built. He replicated the fastener inside the new door to match the one that Rollie Noble made for the other door. The guild intends to pay for materials for the Blacksmith Guild to replicate the exterior hardware to match, as well.
