### **Brief Overview:**

On March 31st, 2021 Governor signed into law to be effective in late 2022 or early 2023: Legalize use of recreational cannabis (marijuana) for any adult at 21 years of age or older may obtain and transport up to 30z of cannabis or up to 24 grams of concentrated cannabis in a public place without criminal misdemeanor or penalty. One can smoke cannabis where one can legally smoke cigarettes: except in a vehicle. These regulations will be under the administration of NYS Office of Cannabis Management and a NYS Cannabis Control Villages Board. Cities, and Towns determine local options. We encourage attendance and vocal participation; as Site Development and/or other decisions may be locally enacted on or before December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021.

\*All COVID guidelines that are in place at the time of the meeting will be followed. If you plan to attend and are not COVID vaccinated please wear a mask and practice social distancing.

Hello everyone,

Your Village Trustees, Town Council, Village Mayor and Town Supervisor believe the Information Meeting for MRTA is worthy of your attendance and voice. So, please attend if you can.

At our July Board Meeting Trustees and Mayor agreed to set aside twenty-five hundred (\$2500) as Village portion for a fifty thousand (\$50000) USDA Rural Water Grant. If we receive Grant Award; Trustees will decide at that time possibly to move forward and hire an Engineering Firm to study Smullen Avenue water distribution system. We will report more as time goes by.

The Nine Brook Street demolition project is moving along. The one hundred percent (100.0%) FEMA reimbursable project to our Village: demo estimated completion by middle October if not sooner.

Trustee Michael Reynolds will soon be resigning from the Village Board of Trustees. We would like to thank Michael for his 8 years of dedication to the Village and we wish him the best in his future endeavors. With Trustee Reynolds' resignation comes an open seat on the Board of Trustees. If you have interest in fulfilling the rest of this seats term that comes up for re-election in March

2022, please contact me at vonvmayor@stny.rr.com or stop by and see me.

It seems the Municipal Building Window Renovation project will begin later than we all believed. Good results take time; as, that is true with this project. Architect is preparing bid documents for eventual submittal.

Current Village Code Enforcement Officer Bill Foster will be retiring from code at the end of August. We thank Bill for his time as CEO and all he has done for the Village. Taking over for CEO Foster will be Chance Spoonhower. Chance is well known here in Northern Tioga County as Town of Berkshire CEO, Town of Newark Valley CEO and his own business interests.

Our Village will eventually receive ninetyfour thousand (\$94000) dollars from the American Recovery Act Federal 2021. Without going into vast amounts of detail: Capital investment in Water and/or Sewer and Infrastructure are potential Nothing is ever easy; these options. come with many, entitlements restrictions and an eventual federal review of the dollars the spent by Municipalities. Villages and Towns do have some spending flexibility; so, I have shared much data with our Trustees as stewards of these monies.

We hope for a Safe Summer for all.


If you have had the opportunity to call the Village office or DPW recently, I am sure you

have noticed that we have a new phone system. With this system, we were able to meet two



goals; reduce expenses and upgrade to upto-date technology, both benefitting our residents. Please bear with us as we adjust to this system, if you happen to get disconnected, please call us back. If you have not paid your Village taxes yet, we are continuing to collect through October 31st. Penalties are assessed each month, please contact us to verify the current amount due. Taxes can be paid in person at the Village office, placed in the drop box located just outside the office door, sent in by mail, or paid by credit/debit card on our website <a href="http://villagenv.com/online-payments/">http://villagenv.com/online-payments/</a> (note processing fees apply).

Hunting season is right around the corner, save yourself the trip to the big box stores over town and stop into the Village Office to get your Hunting licenses, DMP's and Fishing licenses. Please make sure you



have your previous years license, or your state issued ID with you. The 2021-2022 Hunting guide is also available, make sure you get one as some of the state regulations have changed for this year.

Bill Foster will be retiring as Village Code Enforcement Officer as of August 31<sup>st</sup>. We would like to thank Bill for his years of service in this position. Bill stepped in when the Village was in need. We appreciate Bill's knowledge can-do attitude & dedication. We would like to welcome Chance Spoonhower as the Village's new Code Enforcement Officer.

The DPW has been keeping busy with road pavina projects that included Silk St., part of Maple Ave. and the road into the Trout **Ponds** Park. This vear's pavina also included paving the parking area at

the park. Striping of these streets will happen soon.



There has been an ongoing problem with people entering the wrong way onto Park Street, our only one-way street in the Village. To make signage clearer to the drivers that are attempting to turn from

Rock St. on to Park St. we have placed new one-way arrow signs and replaced the Do Not Enter signs.



We will continue to pick up brush and leaves every Tuesday during the summer through November 2<sup>nd</sup>. The new collection schedule has continued to work well into this summer and is helping keep the amount of brush on the streets down and is taking less of our time to complete.

The water department had a village wide detection survey completed by NY Leak Detect to locate any water leaks in our system. No main line leaks were detected, 3 service line leaks were found, we will get them repaired before fall is here. The Village has a very secure and safe water system, and we will continue to do spot checks as the year goes on. The water department did have a power problem at well 4 which was repaired and did not have any impact on the system.

The sanitation department has noticed less garbage on most weeks so the new recycling program seems to be working but residents need to continue to recycle as much as they can.

One last reminder, if you are signed up for Village garbage collection service, please have your cans to the curb by <u>6:00am Monday mornings</u>, we start early as its safer for our crew to be in the roadways when there is less traffic.

### **CODE ENFORCEMENT:**



The time has come for me to step away from code enforcement as I look towards retirement. The Village of Newark Valley has hired a new code officer to take over the CEO duties, Chance Spoonhower will be starting August 1 and I will stay on until August 31<sup>st</sup> to assist him in ongoing issues.

The state highway department went through the village and cleaned the curb areas along Main St. While inspecting that work, I have noticed many residents mowing their grass into the road, so the following is for those people. IT IS DANGEROUS!....and in New York State, it's illegal and a fine able offense! According to New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law Sec. 1219:

Putting glass or other injurious substances on highway prohibited. (a) No person shall throw or deposit upon any highway any glass bottle, glass, nails, tacks, wire, cans, snow or any other substance likely to injure any person, animal, or vehicle upon such highway. (b) Any person who drops, or permits to be dropped or thrown, upon any highway any destructive or injurious material or any material which interferes with the safe use of the highway shall immediately remove

the same or cause it to be removed. You guessed





material. Grass clippings can be slippery when they are dry and feel greasy when they are wet. If you can imagine hitting them with a bicycle or motorcycle, you can guess that they could cause a problem.

The same goes for leaves that are raked from your lawn. In <u>Vehicle and Traffic Law section</u> <u>1220</u>, it mentions rubbish:

No person shall throw, dump, deposit or place, or cause to be thrown, dumped, deposited or placed upon any highway, or within the limits of the right of way of such highway, or upon private lands adjacent thereto, any refuse, trash, garbage, rubbish, litter or any nauseous or offensive matter.

Grass clippings and leaves also plug drains and cause flooding. So, this weekend, if you're mowing your lawn by the street be sure that you don't blow those clippings out there. It could cost you!



- Travel Training: Helps individuals navigate rural and urban transportation resources safely and independently. One-on-one or small group trainings for clients and/or caseworkers are available.
