We would like to officially welcome Ted Hardenstine, Jr. as your newest Village Trustee. We are thrilled to have Ted join the team and feel he will be a great addition to the Village Board. I would also like to welcome back the returning Board members, Jim Tornatore- Mayor, Scott Kasmarcik- Deputy Mayor, John Tomazin- Trustee, and Joe Mooney-Trustee.

Now that the nicer weather is upon us, we are enjoying being outside more often. If you are walking your four-legged family members, please remember to leave the house prepared to clean up after them. We can't control where our pets decide to "go" - it may be in someone's yard, a vacant property, on a sidewalk or at one of our public parks. Please clean up after your pet – no one likes to step in dog poo or clean up after someone else's pet. Please help to keep our beautiful Village looking its best.

As with every spring, there is a lot going on in the Village office. We are preparing the annual report to send to the State. This report is similar to a tax return, but for municipalities. We are happy to report that we have received our annual fiscal rating from the state. Our Village has received a 'No Designation' rating, which is the best rating a municipality can receive. We will soon have our annual audit from our CPA firm, Insero and Co., for our water system. This audit is an annual requirement as a condition of our bond with USDA.

Our water rates have not been adjusted since 2009. Due to increasing costs everywhere, we have determined that it is now necessary to make an adjustment. You will notice a change in your upcoming, June 1st water billing. Changes will be in your water usage portion of the quarterly bill.

A reminder how your quarterly bills are calculated; water is billed for actual usage for that quarter. Meters are read on or around the 15th of the month prior to your bill date. Garbage/Recycling on the other hand is billed in advance. For example, your June 1st bill is for water used from the February 16th thru the May 15th; Garbage is for July – September collection. If you have any question of this, please don't hesitate to contact us.

The Village offers several delivery and payment options. Bills can be mailed or emailed directly to you. Payments can be made in-person, mailed, placed in the drop box, online at www.AllPaid.com (processing fee applies) or via direct debit from your bank account. Contact the office with questions or for more information.

At home COVID tests are still available for no cost at the Village office. Feel free to stop by and pick some up.

Happy Spring from Tappan-Spaulding Memorial Library! We hope you are enjoying the sunshine as much as we are! We have two major announcements to share:

1. Our beloved **LEGO Night is BACK** and will be the 2nd Wednesday of the month beginning **May 11th**, 2022! LEGO Night will be held in the Noble Room in the Post Office Building across

the street from the library. All children are welcome to bring their imagination and come build with us from **6:30 -7:30pm**. Each month there will be a different theme and a drawing for a LEGO giveaway. Stop in the library and check out the LEGO builds that the children came up! They will be on display in between LEGO Nights.



2. On Tuesday, May 17, Newark Valley Central school district voters will get the chance to vote on a referendum that will provide \$50,000 as an annual provision for the Tappan-Spaulding Memorial Library in Newark Valley. This is the first time that the library has pursued this funding option in its 114-year history. State law allows the proposed creation of this form of funding to be put up for a public vote by the school district in which the library is located. The appropriation is not part of the school budget and does not affect school district funding.

Tappan-Spaulding Memorial Library is a municipal library by charter. Trustees comment that the funding initiative is necessary due to an increase in operating expenses coupled with reductions in revenue in recent years. For fiscal year 2021, 10% of the library funding came from Tioga County and 5% from grant funding. Another 5% came from individual donations from generous patrons and businesses. The remaining 80% of library funding in 2021 came from the sale of investment holdings. While the library is ever grateful for the support from the County of Tioga and the Town of Newark Valley, we still

operate on a negative budget. This means we are dependent on our reserve fund. In recent times there has been a significant decline in income from those reserves. Continued sales of investments cannot be a sustainable longterm solution, as they would eventually be liquidated. This initiative ensures that the library will have a reliable source of funding to continue to provide the same level of services to the community. Almost all the libraries in the Finger Lakes Library System of which we are a member, use this method to raise stable funding community critical for their operations.

Should this vote pass, the funding provided would enable us to maintain our open hours, continue to provide competitive wages for our staff, be able to continue programs and events for all ages, add more new materials, keep current with technology and most importantly, have stabilized funding to cover budget shortfalls. While this proposition adds an additional tax burden to our residents, based on the assessed property value at a rate of \$.16 per \$1000, it comes out to \$16 a year for the household with an assessed value of \$100,000, which is a small and reasonable amount for our expansive library services.

Again, the vote on the library funding initiative will take place on Tuesday, May 17th from noon to 8 p.m. in the Newark Valley High School Auditorium and is placed as a proposition on the school ballot. All voters eligible to vote in the school district elections and budget vote would also be eligible to vote on the library funding initiative.

Bluebell Day at the Farmstead

The Newark Valley Historical Society will hold Bluebell Day at the Farmstead on Saturday, May 21, 2022 from 10am to 2pm at the Bement-Billings Farmstead. This event is free to the public and includes a wide variety of activities. Guided bluebell viewing walks along a portion of the farmstead's Sycamore Trail are scheduled for 10:30am, 11:30am, 12:30pm and 1:30pm. Visitors are also welcomed to take self-guided walks along the trail. An informative tree walk is scheduled for 1:00pm. For added fun on the trail, the Tappan Spaulding Memorial Library will host a story walk activity featuring the book The Hidden Rainbow by Christie Matheson. There will be two different, family-friendly craft activities held in the farmstead's Welcome Center. Join us from 10am to 10:45am to make bluebell themed gift cards and bookmarks. From 11am to 11:45am, visitors can make a decorated hat. The snack bar will offer a menu of beverages, hot dogs and desserts. Seating is available in the farmstead's covered picnic table area near the snack bar. Bluebell seedlings can be found by the heritage garden. A variety of other plants will be available to take home with you, for a donation. A selection of unique items will be offered for sale in the Gift Shop.

Members of the historical society's guilds will provide demonstrations throughout Bluebell Day at the Farmstead. The Blacksmith's guild will be working at the farmstead's Blacksmith Shop. The Black Powder guild will demonstrate how to build a musket in a booth behind the Welcome Center. Members of the Shuttles and Spindles guild will demonstrate spinning and weaving in the Loom Barn. They will also have some hand carders and wool available for visitors who'd like to learn how to prepare fiber prior to spinning it. Members of the Cooking and Guides guild will demonstrate how to sew with antique sewing machines in the farmhouse parlor from 12:30pm to 2:00pm. All of the guilds are accepting new members. So, Bluebell Day is an ideal time to interact with the demonstrators and learn more about heritage skills and tools.

Plan to explore the many activities and demonstrations planned for Bluebell Day at the Farmstead. Free parking is available in the lot next to the Welcome Center. NEWARK VALLEY FIRE DISTRICT:

Greetings from the Newark Valley Fire District



First, many people don't understand the difference between the NV Fire District and NV Fire Department. These are two separate organizations that work together to provide fire protection services.

The NV District is a geographic area comprised of our village, town, and small parts of the town of Owego. It is administered by five non-paid elected commissioners who are responsible to provide fire protection to those areas. This Fire District owns the fire station/hall, all apparatus (the red trucks), and most equipment. The Fire District is totally taxfunded, and as such we are always trying to balance the tax rate and fire safety and quality of service. The district works with the NV Fire Department to provide the manpower (people on the red trucks) and technical services.

The Fire Department is all volunteer and consist of the chiefs, officers, and firefighters. Our Fire Department is currently very well equipped, trained, organized, and functional with very dedicated members who provide many hours of volunteer service. The NV District is very proud and supportive of the NVFD. Bear in mind that the quality and capacity of your Fire District is a factor in your homeowner's insurance rates.

In addition to fire fighting and rescue responsibilities, the Fire Department also functions as a social organization and includes activities such as Open House, parades, breakfasts, and fire prevention activities. The Department is a non-profit 503C organization and is totally funded by donations and various fundraising events.

We, as most volunteer organizations, are always in need of additional members. Along with firefighters, we need members for Fire Police, Fire Auxiliary, and various talents and skills from people of all ages. The training and activities can be challenging but usually fun and rewarding.

Additionally, the fire hall is available for rental. For information and booking, please contact Renee Callahan at 765-5409. The Fire Department also rents their pavilion located at the Dept. training grounds (behind the station, across the tracts, off Marean Rd.) 
