June 27th, 2023 – Lowe's has announced that the Village of Newark Valley's Trout Ponds Park is one of 100 community projects to be completed this year as part of [Lowe's Hometowns](https://www.lowes.com/hometowns), the company's largest-ever community impact program. Launched in 2022, Lowe's Hometowns is a five-year, \$100 million commitment from Lowe's to rebuild and revitalize community spaces nationwide.

Thanks to the Lowe's Hometowns grant, the Village of Newark Valley will be able to restore and improve the pavilions, our gazebo and attached walking bridge, the public restrooms, drinking fountain, 6 grills and the basketball court! These improvements will provide a safer and cleaner park for all residents, visitors and surrounding community members who utilize the recreational heart of our community.

This year's Lowe's Hometowns projects were selected from 94 communities across 41 states and Washington, D.C., and will address needs specific to each community, from housing and community centers to outdoor spaces and facilities for first responders and veterans. Each project will receive a grant from Lowe's to make physical improvements that help local organizations continue to make meaningful impact in their communities. At the core of this commitment are Lowe's red vest associates, who share a passion for giving back to their communities and provide support to every Lowe's Hometowns project.

Now in the second year of the initiative, Lowe's Hometowns invites nonprofits and community members to share stories of projects in need. Lowe's is partnering with the Village of Newark Valley, local Lowe's associates, construction pros, and impact partner [Points of Light](https://www.pointsoflight.org) to complete this project.

Mayor's Message

Hello everyone,

The time has come to share our exciting news! Your Village has received a grant from “Lowe’s Hometowns” and “Points of Light Foundation” for your Trout Ponds Park rehabilitation. Proposed projects will include:

- ❖ Renovate Bathrooms - repair walls, replace roof, ADA interior fixtures, and ADA compliant doors.
- ❖ Remaining Pavilions Update - repair floor, new roof, fascia, new grills
- ❖ Gazebo - replace roof.
- ❖ Bridge – repair/replace abutments, and railings.
- ❖ Basketball Court - remove current pad, install new pad and hoops, line court.
- ❖ Park Entrance - remove rusty wire guardrail, install new matching fences, and install new reservation plaque.
- ❖ Picnic Area - new grills
- ❖ Drinking Fountains – two units

We will advertise a volunteer day for all painting and weatherizing, including but not limited to the familiar red vest Lowe’s employees, Village staff, Trustees, and residents. We all have interest in accomplishing these and many more projects in the future.

Your Trustee Joe Mooney, Clerk-Treasurer Pam Benthin, Deputy Clerk Jessica Moore and DPW Working Supervisor Matt Seamans nurtured this process over the most recent two years. Last year we did not receive the Lowe’s award; however, that did not stop your Village from applying once again. Rehabilitation of infrastructure, parks, water systems and buildings take patience and perseverance. Your Village will distribute RFP (bids) to contractors soon for eventual selection. At times, some may wonder why your Village Government exists. This award along with many, many others in the recent past is just another of those reasons. This is the “value added” approach guided by your Mayor and Village Trustees. We will update you on the project in your next newsletter and on the Village website and Facebook page.

At our July meeting your Trustees appointed Douglas Cornwell as Historian. Your Town of Newark Valley initiated this same process. Doug reported happenings at the Historian Office and some long-term initiatives, such as 2026 America will celebrate our Semi Quincentennial or 250 years of Independence. The Historian Office is staffed by volunteers Doug Cornwell, Janet Frieman, JeanEllen Parmelee, Marty Schneider, Sharon Weed and Gwen Stephens. Secondly, some of your Trustees and Office will begin employee search for the eventual replacement of our Deputy Clerk/Treasurer. Long term, this is a reduction from the three previous office staff to a future of two valuable employees.

Science, Agriculture Teacher and FFA Advisor Greg Schweiger created this garden in 2018 working together with your Village of Newark Valley and the Owego Rotary. Your Trustee Ted Hardenstine and Greg are both teachers and coaches in our school system. Your Village partnership with Newark Valley School District is strong and succeeding.

Tioga Soil & Water District along with FFA students successfully planted nearly 200 trees and shrubs along the East Branch of the Owego Creek. Your Trout Ponds Park is looking good.

I do continue to so enjoy the initiatives and forward thinking of your Village Trustees. Ted Hardenstine, Scott Kasmarcik, Joe Mooney and Jackie Wandell. All invest in our Community.

These upgrades will add to the recreational heart of our community. Acquiring this grant was a combined effort between Trustee Joe Mooney and village staff with the support of the Village Board. I look forward to continuing working with you to see this project come to fruition!

The library board also has a new Trustee. We would like to welcome Kirstie Hardenstine as the newest library board member. Our Tappan-Spaulding Library is a huge asset to our community, offering a huge variety of events and services for people of all ages. Thank you, Erin and the entire library Board and staff, for all that you do!

We have recently completed our annual CPA audit. We anticipate a full report shortly, however, during discussions with the auditors there were no significant findings. This is incredibly important to the office staff and board ~ maintaining proper cash handling and accounting records is one of our top priorities.

We have been notified by NYSEG that they will soon begin installing Smart Meters for all residents and businesses in our area. The process will take place in Fall 2023 through Winter 2025. You will be notified by NYSEG via mail and phone before the changeover takes place. When the meter is replaced, there will be a short interruption in service, approximately ten minutes. NYSEG will be having self-guided Open Houses, with NYSEG representatives available for questions. PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

I hope this newsletter finds you enjoying your summer. The DPW has been busy amid our normal daily routine, with resurfacing roads. We were able to resurface 6 roads this year. I would like to thank the Town of NV for all their help and support in this task. This process of resurfacing will not be complete until all this year's roads, and last year's roads have been swept of loose stone and debris. The roads will then be coated or (fogged) with a final layer of emulsion to seal the road surface. This final emulsion will not only seal the road but will limit the amount of dust disturbed by vehicles passing over it. We thank you for your patience and understanding as we finish this task.

Your DPW has also recently taken part in two very important inspections of the water system. The inspection of our water reservoir went very well. The inspector drops a ROV (remote operated vehicle) into our reservoir and inspects all facets of the contents within. Shortly after monitoring his video surveillance screen the inspector turns to me and said, "I will drink your water". I found this to be an odd statement, so I asked, "wouldn't you drink from all the tanks you inspect?" His reply was shocking. "No not hardly....". When I looked at his monitor I could clearly see, through 23' of water, every pipe and the bottom of the tank. He also stated that we have very little sedimentation collected on the bottom. All

in all, the inside and the outside of our 13-year-old reservoir are in very good order. This is a good testament to our clean water distribution system. The second inspection was the state sanitary inspection of our water system. This inspection is conducted by not only a state inspector but also our local DOH (Department of Health). After a complete and thorough inspection of the water system they found one critical violation. (5-1.31 Protect the water distribution system from cross contamination.) Explanation – Trucks are being filled at the fire hydrant next to the well house by the village barn. The hydrant mounted water meter we use to monitor water taken, is not equipped with an RPZ (reduced pressure zone) which prohibits backflow contamination. The inspector's correction – After a water meter with an RPZ has been installed a village employee must be present when filling is in progress. The village is currently purchasing the RPZ required. What does this mean to you, the water consumer? Not much really, simply put when the fire department, town, county, and state trucks utilize the water system they will need to use the hydrant at the village barn, with the RPZ attached, and a DPW employee must be present. Please notify the DPW if you notice any fire hydrant being used by a non DPW employee – (607)642-8700.

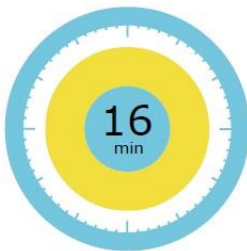

The average response time for 2023 is currently 16 minutes. This is the average response time for the entire territory for Maine Emergency Squad, Inc.

Maine Emergency Squad, Inc. has been seeing a busy year! To date we have had 850 calls for service resulting in 729 patient contacts. Patient contacts are calls for service in which we treated and/or transported a patient. Maine Emergency Squad, Inc. is currently maintaining about 4 to 5 calls per day on average. To date in Newark Valley alone we have had 160 calls for

service, and we have covered over 93% of these calls.

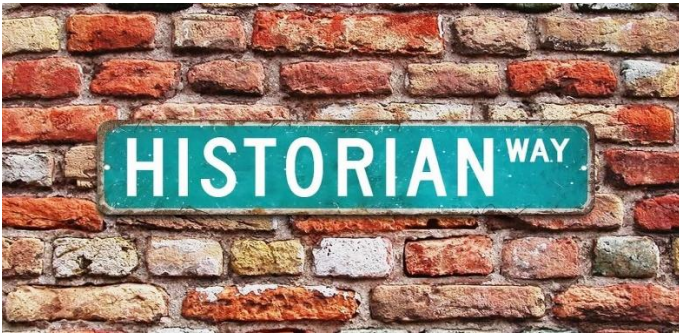

The most valuable antique is an old friend. Lifelong learning about history helps our community progress into the future.

The beginnings of my research into local and family history began in Newark Valley in 1970. During the 1970s, I often met with the historians in the towns of Newark Valley, Berkshire, and Richford, especially when working on college papers in History. Wonderful experiences!

It is so great to be able to offer my services to this community in return for the benefits I had in growing up here. Certainly, all the same people are not here today. The community is here, as different as it is from what remains in my own memories of Newark Valley.

Ginnie Mullen and her family were a part of my life when growing up here in Newark Valley, plus when our paths crossed in Florida.

At this time, I am concentrating on cleaning up the historian's desk, piled with paperwork, photos, and documents which have accumulated since the fall of 2022 when Ginnie Mullen passed. There is still much more to be accomplished in the next few weeks.

We have two donations checked into our office. One was from John Howland, a history of the Onyx chapter of the Order of Eastern Stars of Newark Valley. The second donation was received from Sharon Weed, a Newark Valley High School yearbook. We thank both individuals plus any others who have given historical items to this office in the past and continuing into the future.

We can always use more help in this office. If you have 2 hours per week, or even per month, we'd appreciate assistance in organizing and caring for the materials in the history office. If you have some background in organizing records in libraries, offices, or schools, and are interested in providing community service for 1-2 hours per week or month, we would be happy to have you join us.

Besides being available when the history office is open (Wed., 2-4), you might find me at the Newark Valley Historical Society Depot concerts each Friday night until the end of August. At these events, food is served beginning at 5:30 and the concert follows at 7 PM. Would be glad to sit and chat about interests in Newark Valley history or any other interesting topics about Newark Valley.

We are at the history office Wednesdays, from 2—4 PM. We would be happy to meet with people at the office, located behind the NV Town Office at 109 Whig Street. Or ask for an appointment by email at newarkvalleyhistory@gmail.com. We can be reached at 607-642-8705 but be aware that we are working out the kinks to be able to monitor this phone more often. Please bear with us.

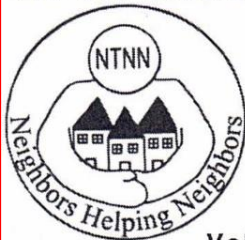
