# LOWES HOMETOWNS GRANT -TROUT PONDS RESTORATION AND **REPAIR:**

Many village residents may have noticed that our Trout Ponds Repair & Restoration Project, made possible by the Lowe's Hometowns grant, is in full swing. Many thanks to those community members that came out on Friday, October 20th to take part in our "Red Vest Day," where Lowe's associates from near and far came to help us paint our park entrance gates, benches, picnic tables, pavilions, gazebo, and walking bridge. Thanks also to the NVHS Interact club who helped level and seed some uneven grassy areas in the park. Last but certainly not least - many thanks to our Village office staff, DPW staff as well as our Mayor and Trustees who participated in this event as well! The rain held off and we were able to get a lot of work done!

In the coming weeks the project will progress toward completion. Major repairs and renovations include:

The old, uneven asphalt pads and basketball hoop have been removed and a new larger, full-



size basketball court poured. has been The new basketball hoops have been installed, however the court will be sealed and painted later this spring, when the weather permits. During winter the

season we hope to have the court double as an ice-skating rink, if the weather cooperates! This is an exciting addition to our beloved park, and we will have more information on the ice-skating rink as the plan progresses and the weather changes.

 The two small pavilions have been refurbished with new concrete pads, new roofs, and posts have been replaced where needed. The gables and posts were painted as part of our Red volunteer



• The second "large" pavilion has had all posts replaced, as well as a new roof installed. These posts will be painted next year once the pressure treated lumber dries out enough to do so. Two new grills will be installed on the back side of the pavilion, in the hopes that the prevailing winds don't travel through the pavilion and smoke out your party while cooking anymore! The old grills will be removed and scrapped.













 All the parks picnic tables were painted as part of our volunteer day as well, and the picnic area near Owego Creek (off to your left as you enter the park) will be outfitted with 2 new grills.

The gazebo has been re-roofed with asphalt shingles and weatherproofed along with the walking bridge. At the time of this project summary, the bridge abutments were being leveled off so the bridge can be re-attached to the gazebo. There are a few



minor cosmetic fixes left to be completed on the bridge and gazebo. These repairs will increase safety and hopefully bring the "centerpiece" of our park back to its former glory – fit to hold celebrations of all kinds once again!

 Also, in-progress is the renovation to the public restrooms. The bathrooms will be outfitted with new toilets, vanities, sinks, and hand dryers.
 New, larger doors and handrails will make the

• Two new, environmentally friendly drinking fountains will be installed. One near where the current water spigot is located near the gazebo, and one in between the bathrooms and the baseball fields. These water fountains are equipped with a bottle-filling station and have 3 levels of drinking fountains to accommodate adults, children, and pets.

Our main objective for park repairs and improvements was to address specific structural and safety issues and to provide safer, cleaner, and more enjoyable recreational facilities to a large part of the Newark Valley community. This includes Village, Town and other Northern Tioga County residents that rely on the park for recreational activities. Offering low or no cost recreational facilities and activities is an important and valuable service our local government provides, and we hope this project has long-lasting positive effects by increasing park usage and thus promoting healthy lifestyles across all age groups. Many thanks to



Lowe's Home **Improvement** and the Lowe's Hometowns initiative for enabling us to complete park repairs and making these improvements a reality. A very special thank you goes out to Newark Valley

alum Mike Shady. His e-mail from two years ago made us aware of this grant funding and without his help, none of these park improvements would have been possible. Additionally, it has been a pleasure to work alongside Pam Benthin, Village Clerk/Treasurer and Matt Seamans, DPW Supervisor to manage this project – they deserve a

big shout out for the extra hours they've put into this project and seeing it through. We would like to thank the Town of Newark Valley Highway Department for helping with the disposal of the old basketball court. Thanks as well to Karl and Chance Spoonhower and Spoonhower Construction for all the work they've completed thus far and the work they will complete in the coming weeks! We're beyond excited to bring this project to completion and for the community to enjoy the improved Trout Ponds Park!

## **PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:**

I'm sure the rest of this newsletter will be filled with information about the Trout Ponds renovation project. The project has certainly kept the DPW very busy this summer/fall. What might not have been discussed is that the Village has purchased a new security camera system. The 16-camera system is not only intended to protect the park, but the Municipal building, the village Green, the Village barn, and both Village water wells. We will be adding Wi-Fi at the trout ponds to utilize the new wireless

cameras and using the existing Wi-Fi at the Municipal building and the Village barn. Initially the camera purchase was suggested by the Dept. of Health to protect our well houses, as our current cameras have either failed or will fail in the very near future.

The DPW will continue to pick leaves and yard debris for a little while longer. Leaf pick up will cease as soon as the snow flies. We have also been busy readying trucks and sanders for snow removal. Just a reminder that Village parking laws go into effect 11/1/2023:

Chapter 157. Vehicles and Traffic

Article III. Parking, Standing and Stopping
§ 157-20. Parking prohibited certain hours.

No person shall park a vehicle between the hours specified in Schedule XV (§ 157-43) of any day, unless otherwise indicated, upon any of the streets or parts of streets described in said schedule, attached to and made a part of this chapter.

<u>Chapter 157. Vehicles and Traffic</u> <u>Article VI. Schedules</u>

§ 157-43. Schedule XV: Parking Prohibited Certain Hours.

[Amended 10-14-2008 by L.L. No. 2-2008]

In accordance with the provisions of § 157-20, no person shall park a vehicle between the times specified upon any of the following described streets or parts thereof:

Also please be diligent in keeping your sidewalks and drains clear of snow.

<u>Chapter 140. Streets and Sidewalks</u> <u>Article V. Removal of Snow and Ice</u>

personnel)

§ 140-31. Responsibility of property owner; snow and ice removal.

All owners of Village real property which abuts upon or is contiguous to a public sidewalk shall be responsible for the maintenance of said sidewalk and shall be required to keep such sidewalk reasonably clear of snow and ice and shall not permit the same to accumulate.

#### § 140-32. Time limit for removal of snow and ice.

A. The Village Board deems it to be a matter of public safety and that from October 1 of each year until April 15 of the following year the following time limits for removal of snow and ice shall be in effect, and the property owner shall be responsible for the removal of ice and snow within the time limits prescribed below without any further notice by the Village:

- (1) Snow and ice shall be removed within 24 hours after the end of a snowfall on noncommercial establishments.
- (2) Sidewalks in front of commercial establishments and commercial parking lots shall be kept free of snow and ice at all times between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
- B. The failure to remove ice and snow in the time period set forth above shall be deemed to be a public emergency, thus allowing the Village to have such ice and snow removed, pursuant to § 140-291(3)(a) above, without any further notice to the property owner.

Also, it is never a bad idea to keep any fire hydrants you have on your property clear of snow and ice. The DPW will clear them routinely, but hydrants are last on the list in the snow removal procedure. I hope everyone has a safe and festive holiday season.




With summer officially gone and fall season upon us, it's time to plant those Spring bulbs and prepare garden areas for winter.

### **NEWARK VALLEY HISTORIAN:**

Newark Valley is a beautiful community. The village green in the center of the community dates back many, many years in history. The Trout Ponds Park has been around many years in the history of Newark Valley. The Alexander Lake / Pond (we always called it lake, as we watched Don Alexander and the FFA make a man-made lake at the top of a hill). Recreation once included a golf course, bowling alley (still have one today), and other forms of recreation. The former wood frame Methodist Church building was moved down the street and near the current brick Methodist Church and became a community center / Opera House which was also utilized as an indoor roller skating rink. Culture, too, has been a very important part of Newark Valley history. Soon the village will add a winter recreation area in the Trout Ponds with an ice rink for ice skating.

The first settlement in this area has been confirmed as being 1791. People may see 1792, as well. But the first settlers such as Abraham (Abram) Brown and others arrived from Stockbridge, MA, and the Berkshire Mountains in 1791.

This area was all once a portion of the town of Berkshire. On April 12, 1823, two hundred years ago, the town was established, breaking from the town of Berkshire. At first, this was known as Westville. Then, as

Newark, due to settlers who had come here from New Jersey where there was a Newark, NJ. When it was discovered, there was a post office of Newark, NY, in Wayne County, the word "Valley" was added. After all, this is a valley.

Otis Lincoln and his family was one of the early settlers. He worked with others to establish the area we now know as the village of Newark Valley. This area evolved into a more densely populated area with the center of business within this area. The village was incorporated in the late 1890s.

As for the town, the first town meeting was held at the house of Otis Lincoln, March 2, 1824." Those elected to the first town council:

Here is additional information about the families represented in this list. Notice the names of original settlers, particularly Abram

Brown, Otis Lincoln, William Slosson, William Bement of the Bement family. Related to William Slosson and Otis Lincoln, one son named William Slosson Lincoln served in the U.S. House of Representatives (lower house of the U.S. Congress).

The Wells surname is on this list, but not certain how this might apply to the man who paid for the building of the municipal building, originally as the high school. The building was erected in 1878. The man who built the building behind the village green was Royal Wells Clinton. Often, a person's middle name comes from the maternal line. It is true in this case. Royal Clinton's mother was Miranda A. Stone. His maternal grandfather was Wells Stone. How the name Wells first appeared in the Stone family is still not revealed from research. The Clinton family moved to this area between 1830 and 1837. At this point, just the facts, ma'am, just the facts.

Thus, the bicentennial of the town of Newark Valley runs from the period of April 12, 1823, to March 2, 1824. Considering this information, I advocate the year of 2024 being the year of the Newark Valley Bicentennial. It might be rather late to begin planning for the Bicentennial. Another town in Tioga County has already begun planning a Bicentennial commemoration for 2024. Is it really too late? Perhaps it is too late to plan for a huge celebration, but can we find a way to commemorate the Bicentennial in other ways, particularly in March 1824.
