Mayor's Message

Hello Everyone,

DPW Scot Coombs has recently surpassed **forty years** as an employee of our Village of Newark Valley. Our past and present Public Works Superintendents and Mayors have depended upon Scot's water system and road knowledge. Scot; congratulations as your dedication to good work continues! When you see Scot during his tasks; if you wish, please thank Scot for his service to our Village and residents.

Our winter season, unlike last year, allows the skating rink to be utilized and enjoyed by families. This annual conversion from basketball court to skating rink is a great addition to your Trout Ponds Park fun. As an aside, we do not have a mechanical Zamboni so your understanding is appreciated. Matt Seamans might include updates in future information letters.

At our January Board meeting after RFP review; we appointed an architect for the two privately owned 10, and 14-16 Whig Street properties. The owners financially obligated themselves to restore these underutilized buildings. Your Village Trustees and Mayor are confident that these properties, once restored, will increase in real property value, positively affect streetscape and curb appeal and is a vital move forward in your Village board's long-term approach to address the many underutilized properties across the Village. This project, once completed, will hopefully initiate other landowners with underutilized buildings to come forward with this same allegiance to improve. This 90% reimbursement to property owners via the

Restore NY funding is financially attractive and a great incentive for property owners in our Village to note when considering future projects. That current percentage rate reimbursement may or may not change as time goes by, depending on funding guidelines/requirements administered by the State agencies who award these funding opportunities.

The Budget Committee brought forward a 1.50% increase in the tax levy over the previous fiscal year at the December 17th meeting. The increase was approved by our full Board. The budget committee worked diligently to minimize the impact to taxpayers, while allowing for the possibility this fiscal year for the Village Office to return to a full staff of three people. Three office staff has been necessary in the past when aggressively pursuing grant awards to benefit the Village. No personnel decisions have been discussed; at the time of this newsletter, but the personnel committee will have more specifics as time allows. It is the opinion of your Mayor that your highly capable staff, without that third person, has not been able to "keep up" with real objectives during this near one year of planned understaffing. The real objectives are set by your Trustees and Mayor. I have voiced this concern at several meetings; so, this will not be a surprise to some.

Our monthly Village meetings are lively and interesting. One of many guest observations commented in January; does our total community area work together toward positive common objectives? What are these common positive objectives? We engaged the guests to consider positive objectives for all at the meetings to review and comment during the guest portion of our Board meetings. These matters will be important to our local and regional communities.

A reminder to all concerning Village sidewalks. Guests recognize that snow and ice

covering walkways are a danger to all; and Code Enforcement reminders are essential. Our guests are correct. Please recognize these walking areas require attention.

Our region has experienced a number of garage and house fires during this time of snow. Your municipal hydrants are utilized by county wide fire departments during municipal aides along with NYS DOT. Please be conscious of cleaning snow and debris away from hydrants near your property.

We wish you all a safe and joyous winter season.

Hello!

I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season and this message finds your families safe and warm

amidst our exceptionally cold and wintery conditions! I am not the biggest fan of the freezing cold, BUT – the weather has allowed our new ice rink at the Trout Ponds to freeze over. We are so fortunate to be able to offer a smooth surface for Village residents, their families, and other nearby neighbors to get out and enjoy skating and/or hockey at no charge!

Many thanks go out to our Village DPW staff (Matt, Scot and Bob) and office staff (Pam and Trisha) for helping to make the rink available before we hit our “deep freeze.” DPW staff has been working hard during normal operating hours to keep the rink clear and smooth for you. Of course, plowing and clearing public sidewalks will be a priority, but they work hard to make the rink available more often than it is not. Additionally, a big shout-out to the Newark Valley Fire Department (especially Jared, Mike & Montana) for volunteering their time and equipment to help fill the rink on multiple occasions.

For those of you that may not be aware, the addition of the ice rink was made possible due to the Lowe’s Hometowns grant the Village received in 2023. Through this grant, not only were we able to add the ice rink to promote active lifestyles in the winter months, but we were also able to restore the majority of the Park’s infrastructure at no cost to Village taxpayers. I hope the vast majority of our residents have been able to enjoy these improvements in one way or another! I believe it is worth mentioning again that we could not have completed the improvements without the help of Carl and Chance Spoonhower of Spoonhower Construction. Our Village will be forever grateful to them for restoring the recreational heart of our community to its former glory. Not only are they a family-owned, local company – they were the lowest bidder on the park project, they completed all the necessary work before the grant deadlines, and they were simply a pleasure to work with, so again many, many thanks go out to them!

Now, as with any new project or activity, there will be a learning curve and a few bumps along the road as we get our bearings on offering this new attraction. We appreciate your patience as we navigate any “curveballs” and as we complete the final additions to the rink and basketball court. One such curveball is we noticed the paint on the court has started to peel up on one corner where we had a leak in the liner prior to the rink freezing. We will evaluate the full extent of the damage done to the fully painted court once we remove the rink this Spring, and then decide on whether it will need to be repainted before our DPW staff adds lines to the basketball court. Thankfully, through the Lowe’s grant process we have made valuable partners with Lowe’s and their suppliers, and we are working with those connections to keep costs down yet still be able to offer these new amenities free of charge.

Enjoy the rest of the winter season, stay safe and warm, and hopefully we will see you at the park!

Takeaways: 1. Summerfest will be held at the village green and at the depot this year.

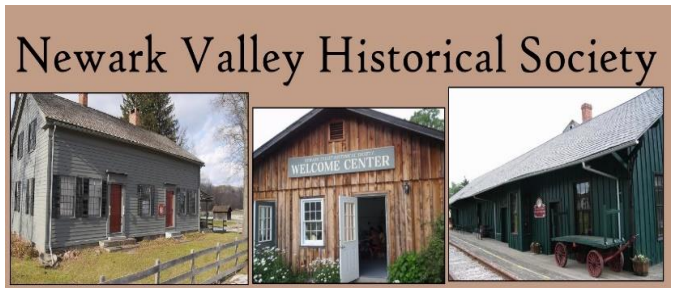

National Wreaths Across America Day was on Saturday, December 14th, 2024, and took place at more than 4,600 participating locations across the country. This was Newark Valley Boy Scout Troop 30's eighth year participating in the placing of wreaths at Arlington National Cemetery. 14 scouts and four adults participated and American Legion Post 130, Falls Church

VA hosted the troop for the three days they attended the event. Each December, wreaths are placed on veterans tombstones through coordinated ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery as well as at additional locations in all 50 U.S. states, at sea and abroad. The event provides an opportunity for communities to gather during the busiest time of year to pause and say thank you to all who have served and sacrificed for our freedom. With each balsam wreath placed, the volunteer says the service member's name out loud to keep his or her memory alive. The purpose is to teach, honor and remember the sacrifice of our veterans. After the ceremony the Scouts were able to spend some time visiting the National Museum of the United States Navy and the National Mall.



As Troop 30 enters its 93rd year please welcome our 64th and 65th Eagle Scouts, Joesph Gillio and Luke Saunders. Both Luke and Joesph will continue in scouting and will be training to

become assistant scoutmasters. Joesph's project was at Saint Patrick's Church in Owego last October. The project involved repairing and refurbishing a portion of the church that had been severely water damaged. In July, Luke's project refurbished a trail on the Waterman Wildlife Preserve by laying down rocks and building two bridges.

The Troop is actively involved in monthly outdoor events, supporting local community events and service projects. Troop 30 is part of the Hiawatha District of the Baden-Powell Council and chartered by Glenn A. Warner VFW Post 1371. The Troop meets on Monday evenings 6:30-8:00 on the second floor of the Newark Valley Municipal Building during the school year. Troop 30 has served the youth of northern Tioga County since 1932.
